Dear Chief Patrol Agent Rodney Scott,

As an organization dedicated to promoting free speech, including freedom of artistic expression, we were troubled to learn that United States Customs and Border Protection (USCBP) is considering the destruction of a mural situated on the border wall that divides San Diego and Tijuana. Prompted solely by its political message and viewpoint, the mural's removal would raise serious First Amendment concerns in addition to concerns relating to the destruction of a work of public art created by a recognized artist. We strongly advise USCBP to allow the mural to remain as is.

Painted five years ago by a group of deported US military veterans under the guidance of disabled United States Navy Veteran, community activist, and artist Amos Gregory, the mural depicts an upside-down flag—a military distress signal—to convey their ongoing struggle to return to the US. Despite being painted without permission on US Government property, the mural has remained on the site for five years without any objection expressed by your agency. Our understanding is that your current review of the work has been triggered by no other concern than complaints aimed at the work's political message.

Public artworks contribute innumerable benefits to local communities, including beautification and opportunities for civil discourse. As a public artwork with a message, the deported veterans' mural stimulates much-needed conversation as befits an area commonly referred to as "Friendship Circle." To paint over this mural so as to mitigate complaints against the viewpoint it expresses would effectively cover up a cogent reminder of deported veterans' plight, removing an opportunity for public debate around this important issue.

We understand that USCBP is still deliberating the fate of the mural, and that your office is currently reaching out to those involved in creating it. While we strongly encourage that conversation, we caution USCBP to consider the disturbing legal and policy implications of silencing veterans' voices, and strongly recommend you allow the mural to remain in place.
