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Dear Ms. Eber and Mr. Tochilovsky,

As a coalition of over 50 national non-profit organizations united in defense of free expression, we are writing to share our concern over Cooper Union's repeated postponements of its exhibition titled *Vkhutemas: Laboratory of the Avant-Garde, 1920-1930*. It's our understanding that the project has been delayed at least twice in response to complaints related to Russia's invasion of Ukraine: once, in late Spring 2022, again in late January 2023.

Even though the Vkhutemas exhibition was based entirely on the work and research of Cooper Union students, and even though it refers to a design school which was operational in a time that long preceded the modern Russian state, some objectors denounced the project as pro-Russian propaganda. Other critics considered it a deeply insensitive choice on behalf of the school, which is located in a Ukrainian neighborhood. In response to these complaints, the school suspended the exhibition.

The suspension is deeply troubling. While academic and cultural programming should certainly take into account concerns driven by geopolitical conflict, it should not be subservient to them. An educational institution's first responsibility is to maintain the integrity of its instruction and scholarly research, not to cater to political demands. If an exhibition about a historical design school is to be suspended just because one hundred years later, after several regime changes, the country in which it operated is involved in a war of aggression, then any display related to the heritage of "bad actor" countries could be subject to a similar fate. This would have crippling effects on cultural and historical explorations. It would subject all human heritage to the reductive filter of contemporary political conflict.
