Dear Director McKenzie Snow,

The National Coalition Against Censorship is an alliance of nonprofit groups dedicated to protecting freedom of expression, including the rights of K-12 students, teachers, and staff. We are writing to urge you to issue guidance regarding Senate File 496, which is creating confusion among lowa school districts and is thereby harming students.

Senate File 496 adds Section 279.80 to the Education and Cultural Affairs Code which states that "A school district shall not provide any program, curriculum, test, survey, questionnaire, promotion, or instruction relating to gender identity or sexual orientation to students in kindergarten through grade six." It also amends the Education and Cultural Affairs Code to exclude from school libraries and classrooms any material that includes "descriptions or visual depictions of a sex act."

We are writing because it appears that lowa school districts are confused about how to implement this new law. In Urbandale Community School district, the ambiguity of the code initially led the school district to assemble a list of nearly 400 books which they believe violated the code. Following community complaints that the district was misinterpreting the law, the administration backtracked and reduced the list to 64 books. Similarly, the Superintendent of Norwalk Public Schools also expressed confusion, "In 20-some years as a public school administrator in lowa, individual school districts haven't been faced with this challenge with very little guidance from the Department of Education."

Indeed, media reports indicate that even the Iowa State Board of Education president John Robbins acknowledged that "There's a lot of confusion, people in the field that I've talked to are looking at the (department) or somebody to provide directions," he said. "Because right now people are kind of either guessing what is right or wrong, and not being in violation of the law."

This confusion is harmful to students because it encourages schools to err on the side of caution and unnecessarily remove books that are valuable to students. According to the *lowa Gazette*, the Urban Education Network and the Rural School Advocates of lowa told the state board that "a lack of clear standards would lead to school districts interpreting the law in the most broad sense in order to avoid being penalized, and that

would lead to unnecessary books being removed." Similarly, an Urbandale school board member has stated, "school districts are fearful and they're putting out lists that are exhaustive and possibly exceed the scope of Senate File 496."

Therefore, we urge you to clarify the scope of these provisions in SF 496.
